#### Four WHS Juniors Win RIT Awards

Wellsville High School will again be participating in Rochester Institute of Technology's High School Junior Awards Program. The Computing Medal and Scholarship Program and the Award for Creativity and Innovation not only recognize outstanding high school juniors, but also highlight RIT's leadership in computing education as well as its creative and innovative programs in many other disciplines ranging from engineering, sciences, and business to design, photography, film and crafts.

Kirby Weinhauer and Andrea Dressig (at left in photo above) have been nominated for the Rochester Institute of Technology Computing Medal and Scholarship by WHS guidance counselors and administration. They have also nominated Jenisa Lehman and Phillip Jones (at right in photo above) to receive the RIT Creativity and Innovation Award. Nominees for these awards must rank in the top 10% of the junior class, demonstrate leadership in school and community, and be pursuing a rigorous college-preparatory curriculum. Students selected to receive these awards are eligible for a \$24,000 scholarship (\$6,000 per year) if accepted and enroll at RIT. Students may use these scholarships to pursue any of the baccalaureate degree programs available in RIT's eight colleges.

## **Brown is RPI Medal &** Scholarship Winner

For more than 95 years, Rensselaer

Polytechnic Institute, in conjunction with high schools around the world, has awarded the Rensselaer Medal to high school juniors who have distinguished themselves in mathematics and science. The RPI Medal in Science and Math has been awarded to



Alexander Brown, a

member of the Class of 2014.

The Medal was first presented in 1916 with two purposes: to recognize the superlative academic achievement of young men and women, and to motivate students toward careers in science, engineering, and technology.

This \$15,000 per year merit scholarship is guaranteed for four years for each medalist who applies, is accepted, and chooses to enroll at RPI. RPI will be hosting an open house for all medalists in the fall of 2013.

## From the Wellsville Board of Education & Administration

Dear Residents,

The Wellsville Central School District's mission statement continues to guide our budget decisions, "To prepare our students to be successful, contributing members of their communities through excellence in education."

This year's budget process was greatly impacted by increased pension payments required by the New York State Teachers' Retirement System (NYS TRS). The NYS TRS payments will increase by 37.25% or \$419,000. This increase will be slightly offset by a reduction in the Gap Elimination Adjustment (GEA) of \$113,747. Without the increase to the NYS TRS, our budget-to-budget increase would have been 0.14% or \$38,865. Please also note that although our GEA cut has decreased, we continue to receive \$768,893 less in state aid than we did in 2009-2010 and that amount has been frozen since 2007.

While many school districts across NYS are having to slash programs and staffing, or increase their tax levy well beyond their tax cap, we have been able to maintain our current student offerings and staffing numbers while reducing our tax levy increase for the third year in a row.

Our major budget maintenance efforts include:

- Appropriating additional fund balance
- Utilizing capitalized interest
- Applying restored Gap Elimination Adjustment and State Aid money

We believe we have developed a reasonable and responsible budget that provides for the needs of our students, yet recognizes the concerns of the residents of our school district. We will continue to provide a quality education for our children, who continue to be our most important focus.

We continue to be proud of our staff members who are dedicated to educating our children and greatly appreciate our incredible facilities. We must continue to work together in order to prepare our students to be able to meet the educational challenges they face, not only today, but also in the future.

We are truly grateful to a community that is supportive of our schools and students. We encourage you to be informed about the budget. Join us for the public budget hearing on Tuesday, May 7, at 6 p.m. in the Middle School/High School Cafeteria, and then please exercise your right to vote on the budget at the Wellsville High School Lobby (Riverside Entrance) on Tuesday, May 21, 2013, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 9 p.m. We also encourage you to contact the District office (596-2170) with any questions or comments you may have regarding the Wellsville Central School District.





# **Author/Illustrator Visits**

Article for the Overview by Scott Vonderheide, WES Librarian

David Catrow, the best selling author and illustrator of children's books visited Wellsville Elementary School, on Thursday, March 25. He presented four times, reaching all grade levels. He also autographed books, attended an early morning teacher reception, and was the guest at an ice cream party for several students who won a trivia contest based on his books. Before he arrived, fourth and fifth-grade students had an



opportunity to write questions for the author to answer. The following are his responses to some of those questions, which he gave during an interview with Mr. Vonderheide, the elementary librarian.

Jocelyn Wilson: Why did you switch from an editorial cartoonist to be a professional children's book illustrator? Istopped having fun illustrating my opinions about public figures and events. I also got tired of people being mad at me because of my work. Some even called me names. I feel like I can offer something positive while still getting my viewpoint across through children's books.

Nathan Jefferds: Why do you always make your people not real? If people are too realistic it anchors the story too much in reality. If I make them funny and exaggerated I can tell the story more convincingly if people understand that it's suspended from reality. Besides, there's enough realism already. We're surrounded by it all day. Why do we want to look at it in a book, too?

**Owen Bentley:** How are you able to imagine your illustrations before you draw them? The pictures that come on the paper are not exactly what appear inside my head, but they're close. That's what makes art exciting for me.

Richard O'Neil: How hard is it to draw? Anything that you practice a lot, you will get better at. Walking seems easy enough for us, but for a baby it's very hard. With practice we get pretty good at it. The same can be said about drawing.

Sonya Plank: How do you illustrate so well? I would really like to know and learn from you. When you read a book, you visualize the story in your mind. Illustrating brings them into existence onto paper for others to see. As an illustrator, I have to develop those abilities through hard work.

**Allison Goodrich:** How long does it take you to create the illustrations for a book? *It probably takes a couple of months.* 

**Breaze Taylor:** Have you ever had to illustrate a story that you didn't enjoy that much? *No, I would never illustrate a story that I didn't like.* 

**Sam Schmidt:** Do other illustrators compliment you? *They do, and I compliment them, too. I think it is important to encourage artists because I like to be encouraged.* 

**Ryan Harrison:** What do you do in your spare time besides drawing? *I ride my bike, play with the dogs and look at birds.* 

**Colston Welty:** What made you become an artist? *I feel like it was something I was born to do.*

**Derrick Sallazzo:** What book inspired you to become an illustrator? *The Cat in the Hat* 

**Aiden Tucker:** What is your favorite book someone else illustrated? *I like the original edition of James and the Giant Peach by Roald Dahl, which was illustrated by Nancy Ekholm Burkert.* 

**Alex Ordway:** Why did you get called to draw pictures for "Dr. Seuss' Horton Hears a Who" movie? *I think the director saw my work and it was reminiscent of Dr. Seuss, who was a big influence on me.* 

Andrea Cook: When are you going to illustrate another movie? I was asked to work on "The Lorax" but chose not to because I didn't want my art to be stereotyped as Dr. Seuss-like. I did work a little bit as a visual developmental artist on the movies "Despicable Me" and "Enchanted."

**Gavin Randolph:** What's your best-seller? *The "Max Spaniel" series has sold over a million copies.* 

**Taylor Hale:** What made you want to write and illustrate about dogs? *Artists should draw what they know. And, I know dogs.* 

**Jacob Riggs:** How many dogs have you owned in your life? *Twelve*.

**Dominic Sawyer:** Do you ever bring your dogs when you visit schools? *No, but I would love too. I don't because they may misbehave.*

Alexa Hill: What book did you enjoy illustrating the most? Have Fun, Molly Lou Melon.


**Stephanie Rouse:** Why is Molly Lou Melon your favorite to draw? *I just like drawing her hair.*


