- Neatness Counts! We cannot overemphasize this point. Write down all of your activities (but be scrupulously honest), and write legibly and neatly in black ink. The Senior Data Sheet is how our community's scholarship donors will perceive you. Do not attach pages.
- Boys: When you turn 18, remember to register for Selective Service online at www.sss.gov
- Please inform the Guidance Office of your post high school graduation plans, college acceptances, scholarship opportunities, job offers, etc.
- Check with your chosen college now if you need tuition assistance.
- Please do not count on local scholarships to underwrite a majority of your college costs. These one-time awards may help pay for some books and perhaps a small portion of tuition. You should already have a financial plan in place.
- Do your very best these last few months! Your senior year grades are important. A final transcript will be mailed to your college in early July.

Start doing college research now! Visit prospective colleges! Many scholarships given in the fall and spring of next year are based on your community service hours. Remember to complete your student activities form, update it when needed and return it to the guidance office. Always do your best in your schoolwork! Your final three-year average will determine class rank, which is recorded on your high school transcript and needed for college and scholarship applications during your senior year.

Alfred University "Outside of Ordinary" Scholars

Alfred University is excited to announce the Alfred University "Out of Ordinary" Scholars Award. Elmira College Key Award

WSS is proud to announce the recipients of the Elmira College Key Award, from the Class of 2023, they are Isabelle Hart and Grace Stonemetz. The Key Award, sponsored by the Elmira College Alumni Association, has been awarded to fine students since 1935. The award of merit is presented to outstanding high school juniors in the top of their class with a minimum cumulative average of 90%. Candidates must also demonstrate school and community leadership.

A Key Award winner receives an \$80,000 tuition scholarship over a four-year period, \$20,000 per year, upon enrolling at Elmira College. The award is renewable each year with an academic average of 3.0 or higher. Recipients attending Elmira College are also honored in the fall of their freshman year by the Alumni Association and are presented with the prestigious Elmira College Key.

Sage Awards Announced

Ashden Hyslip and Isabelle Sparatta, Class of 2023, have been named the “Student Sage” from Wellsville Secondary School. The “Student Sage Award” enables high schools to honor juniors from their school community with this nomination. Recipients of the award will receive a certificate of nomination and an invitation to The Sage College Student Sage Scholars’ Reception during his/her senior year. Upon admission, the student nominees will be eligible for a scholarship to Russell Sage College. Confirmed nominees will receive a scholarship of at least \$16,000 per year to attend Sage College.

Wells College 21ST Century Leadership Award Announced

Recognizing the need for ethical leadership, Wells College presents the 21st Century Leadership Award to high school juniors who demonstrate leadership ability in high school and community activities and exhibit academic excellence. Recipients are nominated by their school counselor and the administration in the spring of their junior year and are then recognized by the Admissions Committee. The 21st Century Leadership Award program is designed to honor these students and grant them a \$40,000 Scholarship for Leaders (\$10,000 per year) for four years of study at Wells College.

The nominees must carry a cumulative average of at least 90% throughout high school. Wellsville Secondary School nominates Sarah Cook and Sara Reitz, to receive the 21st Century Leadership Award at Wells College.

Two Vacancies on the Board of Education

The Wellsville Central School Board of Education announces two school board vacancies expiring on June 30, 2022. These vacancies are for three-year terms and will expire June 30, 2025. Anyone interested in running for the school board can pick up a petition at the District Office located in the Secondary School Complex at 126 West State Street in Wellsville. The petition requires signatures of twenty-five (25) qualified voters of the district, and must be filed with the District Clerk at least thirty (30) days prior to the budget vote on May 17, 2022. The last day petitions can be accepted is April 18, 2022. Please direct any questions you may have to Dawn Youmans, District Clerk at 596-2170.

To qualify for membership on the school board, the following conditions must be met:

- Must be able to read and write.
- Must be a qualified voter of the district; that is, a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age or older, and not adjudged to be an incompetent.
- Must be and have been a resident (but need not be a taxpayer) of the district for a continuous and uninterrupted period of at least one year immediately before election.
- May not have been removed from any school district office within the preceding year.
- May not reside with another member of the same school board as a member of the same family.
- May not be a current employee of the school board.
- May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office.

Inchy the Book Worm

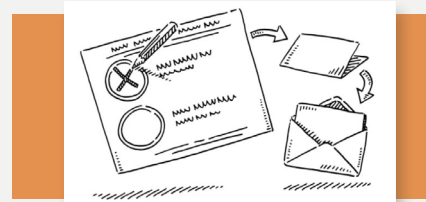

Absentee Ballots



Absentee ballots may be applied for at the office of the School District Clerk, Dawn Youmans, at 126 West State St., Wellsville, NY at least seven days before the date of the budget vote (May 17, 2022) if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the budget vote if the ballot is to be issued to the voter in person. Absentee ballots may not be mailed by the District Clerk **earlier than 30 days** before the vote. An absentee ballot must reach the office of the District Clerk, 126 West State St., Wellsville, NY not later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the budget vote (May 17, 2022).

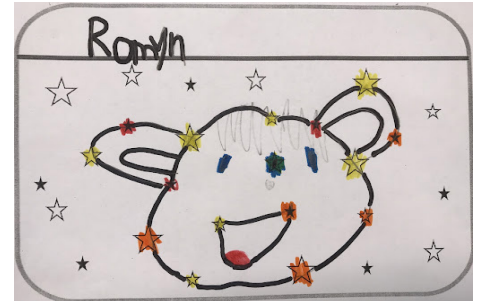
Military voters who are not currently registered may apply to register as a qualified voter of the School District, if they meet the criteria for same. Military voters, as defined by Education Law 2018-d, may request an application to register as a qualified voter from the District Clerk. Military voter registration application forms must be received in the office of the District Clerk no later than 5:00 p.m. on the twenty-sixth (26th) day before the election (May 17, 2022). A military voter may designate a preference to receive a military voter registration, military ballot application or military ballot by mail, facsimile transmission or electronic mail in their request for such registration, ballot application, or ballot. Such designation shall remain in effect until revoked or changed by the military voter.

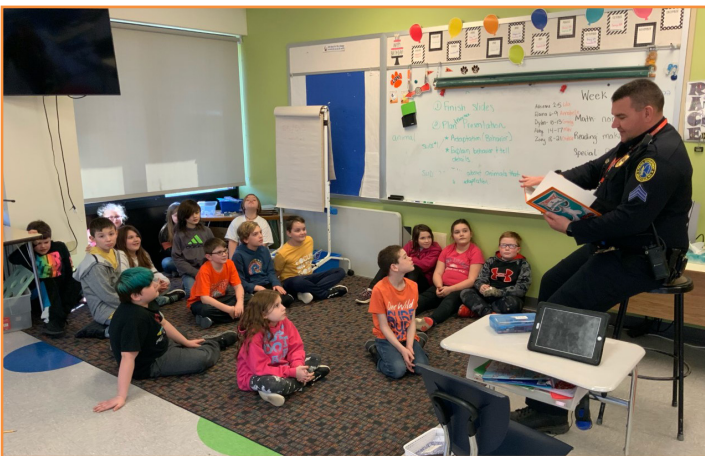
First Grade



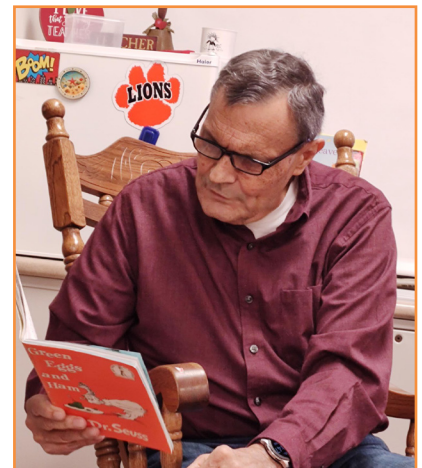

Environmental Science

We in the Environmental Science class have recently done some recycling work for our community. We collected old electronics to keep them out of our landfills so we can help our community and, most importantly, our earth. REACT E-Cycling out of Horseheads, NY came and collected the items we received. They will break down the electronics and sell them to various locations to be recycled into new components for other electronics. We collected just under 1,000 pounds (half ton) of electronics that will not go into the landfills or environment. Thank you to all the faculty and staff that donated items! We hope to hold this recycling drive again.

As we continue to examine ways to help our community and environment, we turned our attention to bats. Bats are going through a major population reduction primarily due to movies depicting them in a negative manner. Their habitats and food are being destroyed, primarily caused by us humans. Did you know thousands of bats are killed by humans alone? Not only is this bad for the bats, but also for humans. Bats provide so much for our ecosystem such as seed distribution, insect population control, pollination of many different plants and crop fertilization. Bats are one of the most misunderstood species in the world. We will be providing 17 bat houses throughout our area. These homes will allow the bats to have a warm and safe location to sleep when they return from their winter migration in the south. If you happen to come upon a bat house or see bats flying around, don't try to harm them, just let them be, as they do a wonderful job for the environment on a daily basis.



WLCS Robotics Qualify for Northern NYS Championships!



The Wellsville Robotics Team began their third season of competition this past fall for this year's game, "Tipping Point." Tipping Point is played on a 12'x12' square field, with teams competing in matches that consist of a fifteen-second Autonomous Period (programmed to move without driver control), followed by a one minute and forty-five second Driver Controlled Period. The object of the game is to attain a higher score than the opposing Alliance by scoring rings, moving mobile goals to alliance zones, and by elevating robots on platforms at the end of a match.

On February 12th, both Wellsville teams competed in a Regional Qualifying event at Canaseraga CSD against some tough competition from all across New York State. Despite Team 68922B losing in the quarterfinals, the team was noticed in several

areas and came away with the most prestigious award given out at each VEX Robotics competition: The Excellence Award. This award is presented to a team that exemplifies overall excellence in building a high-quality robotics program. The team is determined to be a strong contender in numerous award categories in the eyes of the judges, including the quality of their Engineering Notebook, their ranking for other judged awards, their ranking in the Skills Challenge, the quality of their interview with the judges, and overall team conduct and interaction. The earning of the Excellence Award automatically qualified the team for the Northern New York State Championships.

Four days later, both teams competed at another Regional Qualifying event at Cuba-Rushford CSD. Both teams performed extremely well, finishing in 2nd and 8th place amongst the 22 teams from Allegany and Cattaraugus counties during qualifying matches. Both teams excelled in the quarterfinals and semifinals, with Team 68922B making it all the way to the finals, only to lose a close match to an alliance of teams from Cuba-Rushford. During the awards ceremony, Team 68922B walked away with their second Excellence Award in five days! Team 14895A had an impressive showing in the Skills Competition, narrowly missing the top score. In the days following the competition, Team 14895A learned that their high score in the Skills Challenge would qualify them for the State Championships as well, resulting in both Wellsville teams taking two of the only fifty-five qualification spots for the State Championships!

The 9th Annual Northern New York State VEX High School Championships will be held at The Oncenter Nicholas J. Pirro Convention Center in Syracuse on Saturday, March 12. 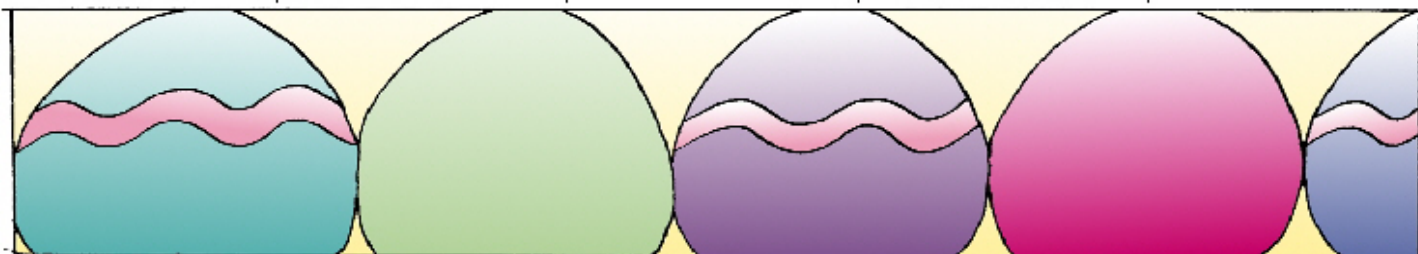

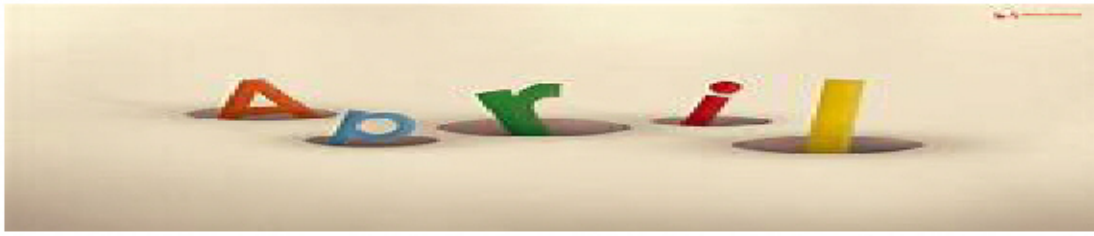
